The International Conference on Education of the Deaf (ICED), Maastricht, Netherlands, July 2005, included a Keynote Address by teacher Stefan Woehrmann from the Osnabruck School for the Deaf in Germany. Deaf children are reading, writing and speaking with more fluency because of SignWriting, which is used daily in Stefan's classes. Stefan shared his positive results with some 800 attendees at ICED 2005.

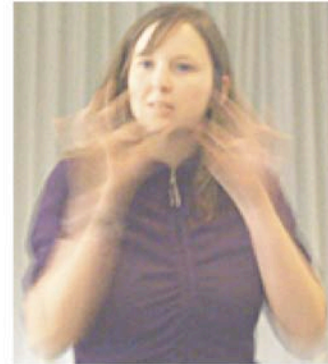

HVA ER TEGNSKRIFT?

Tegnskrift (Sutton's SignWriting) er et system for å kunne skrive tegnspråk - alle mulige tegnspråk. Det er en del av et større system, Sutton's Movement Writing, som kan skrive alle bevegelser og stillinger som mennesker kan ha.

Systemet inneholder mange symboler, for at alle skal kunne skrive det de har bruk for. Men systemet er likevel bygget opp av en liten mengde 'byggelokker', som er satt sammen på en logisk og konsistent måte.

Til forskjell fra andre systemer som er utviklet fo å kunne skrive tegnspråk, er altså Tegnskrift basert på bevegelser, håndformer og annet, i et 2-dimensjonalt mønster. Det er altså ikke lineært, slik som systemene til Stokoe eller HamNoSys. Det skrives heller ikke fra et tilskuer-synspunkt, men fra et tegnbruker-synspunkt.

Det er ikke laget spesielt for forskere, men brukes også som daglig skriftsystem av en del døve rundt i verden. Dette er det eneste systemet som nå egner seg til slik bruk. Likevel er systemet ikke ferdig utviklet, det vil si at når systemet har vært brukt i lengre tid, vil det sannsynligvis bli forenklet og tilpasset det tegnspråket som skrives.

Nedenfor er et lite utvalg fra skoler som bruker Tegnskrift.



Joanne har skrevet brev til Jule

Her ser jeg min egen høyre hånd, med sprikende fingre. Håndbaken er svart, håndflaten hvit.

Dette gjelder for alle håndsymboler.

Høyre hånd er kryttet, med håndflaten mot meg. Den beveger seg ned på venstre hånd, som ligger med håndflaten opp.

Systemet har muligheter for å skrive ansikts-uttrykk, munnstillinger, blikk, øyenbryn, kroppsstillinger og bevegelser - alt det som gjør tegnspråkene sålevende.

Likvel må vi regne med at tegnspråk i skriftlig form blir noe styvere enn tegnspråk i utførelse. Dette gjelder jo også for talespråk.

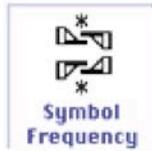
