
Verse 6. About eight or ten days later Festus returned to Caesarea, and on the following day he took his seat in court and ordered that Paul be brought in. Verse 7. When Paul arrived, the Jewish leaders from Jerusalem gathered around and made many serious accusations they couldn't prove. NLT



423 Verse 8. Paul denied the charges. "I am not guilty of any crime against the Jewish laws or the Temple or the Roman government," he said. Verse 9. Then Festus, wanting to please the Jews, asked him, "Are you willing to go to Jerusalem and stand trial before me there?" NLT




Verse 10. But Paul replied, "No! This is the official Roman court, so I ought to be tried right here. You know very well I am not guilty of harming the Jews. Verse 11. If I have done something worthy of death, I don't refuse to die. But if I am innocent, no one has a right to turn me over NLT




to these men to kill me. I appeal to Caesar!" Verse 12. Festus conferred with his
advisers and then replied, "Very well! You have appealed to Caesar, and to Caesar you will go!" Verse 13. A few days later King Agrippa arrived with his




sister, Bernice, to pay their respects to Festus. Verse 14. During their stay of several days, Festus discussed Paul's case with the king. "There is a prisoner here," he told him, "whose case was left for me by Felix. Verse 15. When I was in Jerusalem, the leading priests and Jewish elders NLT




427 pressed charges against him and asked me to condemn him. Verse 16. I pointed out to them that Roman law does not convict people without a trial. They must be given an opportunity to confront their accusers and defend themselves. Verse 17. "When his accusers came here for the trial, I didn't delay.




I called the case the very next day and ordered Paul brought in. Verse 18. But the accusations made against him weren't any of the crimes I expected. Verse 19. Instead, it was something about their religion and a dead man named Jesus, who Paul insists is alive.



9 Verse 20. I was at a loss to know how to investigate these things, so I asked him whether he would be willing to stand trial on these charges in Jerusalem. Verse 21. But Paul appealed to have his case decided by the emperor. So I ordered that he be held in custody until I could arrange to send him to Caesar." NLT




Verse 22. "I'd like to hear the man myself," Agrippa said. And Festus replied, "You will -tomorrow!" Verse 23. So the next day Agrippa and Bernice arrived at the auditorium with great pomp, accompanied by military officers and prominent men of the city. Festus ordered that Paul be brought in. NLT



431 Verse 24. Then Festus said, "King Agrippa and all who are here, this is the man whose death is demanded by all the Jews, both here and in Jerusalem. Verse 25. But in my opinion he has done nothing deserving death. However, since he appealed his case to the emperor, I have decided to send him to Rome. NLT

Verse 26. "But what shall I write the emperor? For there is no clear charge against him. So I have brought him before all of you, and especially you, King Agrippa, so that after we examine him, I might have something to write. Verse 27. For it makes no sense to send a prisoner to the emperor without specifying the charges against him!" NLT
