- n fostering nationalization of the indigenous signed language;
- n training natively fluent Deaf Nicaraguans to be school teachers and role models;
- n providing academic and vocational training to Deaf youth.

CURRENT PROJECTS BASED IN BLUEFIELDS:



OUTREACH PROGRAM:

Deaf *brigadistas* are sent into upriver communities to live with families with a Deaf child. Young Deaf children are exposed to ISN at a language-ready age, and hearing family members are introduced to signing, as well.

FOSTER CARE PROGRAM:

NSLP provides year round foster care for several orphaned or abandoned Deaf children in coordination with the Bluefields chapter of Los Pipitos. NSLP pays for meals, clothing, shelter costs and health care for these children.

MEALS PROGRAM:

NSLP provides a daily meal to needy Deaf children to enable them to thrive at school.

SEXUAL ABUSE AWARENESS PROGRAM:

Deaf children and young adults are especially vulnerable to all the social ills that are common in Bluefields and elsewhere: sexual abuse, domestic violence, alcoholism, drugs and prostitution. NSLP is tackling these issues head-on –

- n Coordination with local health care providers to furnish gynecological services to Deaf women;
- n Providing sex education in the Bluefields Deaf School: reproduction, contraception, sexually transmitted diseases, AIDS awareness;
- n Three week intensive sexual abuse awareness training for four Deaf Nicaraguan teachers furnished by NSLP in collaboration with the State of Maine Department of Health and Human Services (January, 2005 in Portland, Maine, USA)

TRAINING DEAF NICARAGUANS TO BE SCHOOL TEACHERS:



NSLP is empowering young Deaf people to become leaders and role models for the next generation of Nicaraguan children. NSLP brings Deaf youth from different regions to Bluefields and to the U.S. for intensive training as school teachers. These trainees also assist in textbook development and curriculum design.

Training effective teachers requires years of dedicated effort.

- n Co-directors: Zoila Garcia Cantero (Los Pipitos-Bluefields) and James Shepard-Kegl (NSLP)






SIGN LANGUAGE LITERACY PROJECT:

The Bluefields School has one of the most developed sign language literacy programs in the world!




Excerpt from history lesson: Spanish Conquest of Central America


Excerpt from geography lesson: Nicaraguan Geography


Excerpt from literature lesson: Homer's Odyssey




Excerpt from Math Lessons: Percentages


