About Snow White & SignWriting














Out in the woods, there was a castle.








Snow White, a princess, lived with her stepmother,







who was a queen, but she was very mean.


Snow White suffered, working hard cleaning, as the queen ordered her...








...to clean and scrub and do all kinds of chores. Patiently she cleaned and scrubbed the hard floor on her knees.








The queen was haughty and walked through the castle to her magic mirror.


"Mirror, mirror, on the wall, who is the fairest of them all?"








The mirror answered,

The queen proudly went on her way.









Every morning the queen would come to the mirror and ask the same question, and the mirror would give the same answer. Finally, the mirror decided...

beautiful, but who? Don't know."









The next time the queen came and asked, "Mirror, mirror on the wall, who's the fairest of them all?" the mirror answered,...







